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PRAY WITHOUT CEASING

What is prayer? Our immediate response to this question would be prayer is talking to God, intercession or listening to God. We may have various answers but as the Psalmist says prayer is none other than our submission to God. **Prayer is the steering wheel that God gives us to hold on to him**

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 says, Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

We have heard of the above passage from first letter to Thessalonians and

simply don't know what to make of it. How is that possible? Give thanks all the time? Even when we fail a test, when we are homesick, or when things don't turn out the way we want them to be. We don't think we can do that." We desire to be the best Christians, but often we fall short of perfection, especially, in the realm of prayer. Nonetheless, we need to persevere and "pray without ceasing."

First, we need to resolve to make prayer a part of our daily life, not just when-I-get-time or when going through some difficulty. Once that desire takes root, we begin gradually to incorporate different forms of prayer. Consider the reflection of St Therese of the child Jesus from her book "The Story of a soul": "For me, prayer is an aspiration of the heart; it is a simple glance directed to heaven, it is a cry of gratitude and love in the midst of trial as well as joy; finally, it is something great, supernatural, which expands my soul and unites me to Jesus." For St Therese, prayer is something that takes her into the domain of the divine. We are all entitled to enter into the domain of the divine where Jesus is ready to accept us as we are.

Here are some ways of Unceasing Prayer, one of which you might consider adding to your day:

1. Constant Gratitude.

From the moment we wake up until we go to bed, we try to be grateful. When we put our feet on the floor, we thank God for a new day. Before we get into the shower, we intentionally thank God for our hands and fingers, shoulders and arms, feet and toes, legs and knees, all our senses – and we ask Him to bless us and others that day. We thank him for the clean water, for keeping our family safe, for giving us a job, anything else that comes to our mind. At our work place we thank Him for our colleagues and work situations. As the day progresses, we turn to thank Him whenever appropriate. At the end of the day, we reflect gratefully on whatever we experienced, whether joyful or difficult.

2. Special Time

We carve out time for specific prayerful activities. Daily mass can be one of the important spiritual activities for anyone. Besides, we can try morning, evening and night prayers. We can pray the rosary or divine mercy chaplet as often as possible.

3. Frequent Intercession.

We may receive requests to pray for people and come across special intentions. We can reflect on those needs and people, be it our family, our community or parish and pray expecting God to bless them. There are moments that we find a person randomly coming to mind, or a specific situation, or a place, or a country. We can pray for the people or situation or places.

4. Meditation.

We can reserve time for external silence as well as internal silence. We can meditate by taking a scripture verse. We can move to a place where we are not thinking of anything but simply contemplating on God's love and his mercy. No doubt, it's a gift from God but we need to nurture this gift.

5. Christian Music.

We can listen to gospel music while driving. We can listen to our favourite song on our phone and use it for our praise, thanks and meditation.

We need to live in an awareness of God with us; in our thoughts and actions. With this in mind we can move forward trusting and believing in God's providence. We need to take every thought in prayer and every prayer into thanksgiving. Philippians 4:6 says, ...we have to make known our requests to God. Prayer is a special wing God gives us, so that we can sail through safely. Prayer is a weapon that helps us to fight the spiritual battle. Prayer should be the first response to every fearful situation that God allows it to happen. A lack of prayer will cause us to depend on ourselves instead of depending on God's grace.

As we reflect in the coming months on the theme "Watch and Pray," let us devote ourselves to prayer, keeping alert in it with thanksgiving (Colossians 4:2). Let us make every effort by the power of the Holy spirit to *Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication*. (Ephesians 6:18).

The doctors also advised me to go for walk in the morning to get the morning sunlight and also to start with Vitamin D tablets.

As I need to report to school by 7 in the morning it was not possible to go for the morning walk. The tablets did not make much difference and the pain became worse. Romans 5: 3-4, ."Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character and character, hope". During my personal prayer I would offer up this pain and claim the word and the Lord would faithfully provide me the strength to endure and overcome the pain. All this time my husband, my kids and some of our brothers and sisters of our prayer group were praying for me. A sincere thanks to all of them.

Every year the Lord has done mighty wonders during the novena to the Holy Spirit and I believed that this year too He had something wonderful in store for all. When sister Carmine shared on repentance, I realized that there was one particular area of my life where I needed to really repent and ask forgiveness from the Lord. Resentment and unforgiveness can be major blocks for healings to take place. On the third day when sister Revathi was sharing on Joy, during the worship session, I felt both of my hands were being touched. A feeling of warmth ran down through my fingers. Truly it was the Lord who touched me and healed me. From that moment the pain in my joints has left completely. '1 Peter 2:24- "He himself bore our sins. In His body on the cross, so that we might die to sin and live for righteousness, by His wounds you have been healed." Praise be to God who is ever faithful and listens to those who cry out in distress.

The Lord truly worked wonders through all the brothers and sisters who shared during the novena to the Holy Spirit . May the Lord use you all more mightily in his vineyard.

From the world over, he received letters from his fans, one of them conveyed: "Why does God have to select you for such a bad disease?".

To this Arthur Ashe replied: The world over--50,000,000 children start playing tennis, 5,000,000 learn to play tennis, 500,000 learn professional tennis, 50,000 come to the circuit, 5000 reach the grand slam, 50 reach the Wimbledon, 4 to semi finals, 2 to finals. When I was the one holding the cup, I never asked God "Why me?".

And today in pain, I should not be asking GOD "why me?"

In the reading of Mathew 11:28 we read Jesus inviting us to come to him and he will give us rest. Let us take our heavy burdens and place them at the feet of Jesus, who knows all about us and our situations. Jesus invites us to take his yoke and learn from him, for he is gentle and humble of heart. Coming to him in submission and surrender is the first step of faith we can take. Finally, let our response be "Jesus meek and humble of heart, make my heart like unto thine."

BENEFITS OF "COUPLES' PRAYER" IN MARRIAGE

Marriage is "a gift" from the Lord (1 Cor 7:7). At the same time, precisely because of this positive understanding, the New Testament strongly emphasizes the need to safeguard God's gift: "Let marriage be held in honour among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled" (Heb 13:4).

"Jesus, who reconciled all things in himself, restored marriage and the family to their original form (*Mt* 10:1-12). Marriage and the family have been redeemed by Christ (*Eph* 5:21-32) and restored in the image of the Holy Trinity, the mystery from which all true love flows. The spousal covenant, originating in creation and revealed in the history of salvation, takes on its full meaning in Christ and his Church. Through his Church, Christ bestows on marriage and the family the grace necessary to bear

witness to the love of God and to live the life of communion. (Amoris Laetitia - 8, 61 & 63).

It is in our hands to preserve what the Lord has given us - the gift of marriage. We need to safeguard this gift. The strength of the Christian marriage depends on the power of God which the couples receive everyday as they encounter the Lord in prayer. God not only wants us to remain faithful to one another in marriage, but, he wants us to have fullness in marriage with a joyful, loving and stable family life. This becomes a reality when the couples devote some time for praying together.

Here are some of the blessings that will follow the praying couples.

Prayer strengthens the BONDS of marriage

Prayer not only opens communication between you and God, it strengthens the BONDS of marriage. Studies have found the old adage, "Couples that pray together, stay together" to be true. In a recent poll it was revealed that "among married couples who attend church together regularly, the divorce rate is one out of two. That is the same statistic for marriages outside the church. However, among married couples who *pray together daily*, the divorce rate drops to one out of 1,153." Prayer reinforces the connection between couples and as a result, their marriages are strengthened!

Prayer encourages unity

As we come before God as a couple, we are coming as a team and reminding ourselves that we are on the same side. Team players have common goals and direction. Praying together reinforces those goals and that connection. When we offer our prayers to God together we are naturally aligning our hearts as couples for one shared hope and outcome.

Sharing our desires and deepest longings with each other in prayer gives one another an intimate glimpse into the other person's heart. The tender moments that are created when our hearts are open and vulnerable to each other grow our love and level of intimacy in our relationship.

and guide. God gives direction and wisdom that we as couples long for in our relationship. By praying together we are inviting God into our marriage and welcoming His hand on our lives. He will bring healing and joy as He tenderly leads us on the path He has set out for us.

Prayer changes marriages

Praying together cannot help but change our marriages for the better. The connection that develops and grows when we pray together deepens our love and strengthens the <u>BOND</u> in our relationship.
